Information about STEWARDWOMEN;

STEWARDWOMEN (formerly STEWARD Organization) is a women organization founded in March 2009 by some South Sudanese women lawyers and their friends, and managed by women. It was registered with South Sudan Relief and Rehabilitation commission of Magwi County in Eastern Equatoria state in 2009, as a community based, not-for-profit non-governmental organization; and in June 2014 with the Ministry of Justice. It was established to address the problems of sexual and gender based violence, harmful customs on women and girls, child labor and trafficking, community insecurity and conflicts, poor governance and illiteracy in South Sudan. The organization is managed by a Governing Council and a Board of Directors.

1.0 Introduction

This report compiles all the activities and events that took place in the year 2015. The events and activities covered under this report are implemented in the Payams of Pageri, Mugali, Nimule, Kerepi, Magwi and Obbo all in Magwi County, Eastern Equatoria State and Juba county in Central Equatoria State. This report is intended to cover five projects namely “promoting sustainable access to justice for vulnerable women and girls” in Magwi County supported by Mama Cash in Pageri, Nimule and Mugali payams and CORDAID in Kerepi, Magwi and Obbo Payams, “mitigating GBV through training of vulnerable women and girls on bakery and SLA management” supported by the Embassy of France in South Sudan is implemented in Nimule Payam, Access to Justice supported by Pact South Sudan, implemented in Nimule and Mugali, “Supporting citizen-government engagement for the ratification of Maputo protocol in South Sudan, supported by DanChurch Aid (DCA), implemented in Juba and “strengthening technical & institutional capacity of local organisations” supported by IRC. 4.0 Achievements

4.1 Development of 5 training manuals namely;-

- a. Training manual on family court procedure,
- b. Training manual on counselling and communication skills,
- c. Human rights provisions in the statutory laws,
- d. Bakery making and
- e. SLA management.

These manuals remain a big resource of STEWARDWOMEN.

4.2 Formation of a loan's association called STEWARDWOMEN loans group/SACCO.

4.3 STEWARDWOMEN also developed a monitoring tool known as the Knowledge Transfer Form (KTF) to monitor the work of the GBV counsellors who have received training to ascertain the application of the knowledge.

4.4 STEWARDWOMEN was given a tax Identification number by Ministry of Finance, Planning and Development for purposes of deducting 10% from every employee in South Sudan who earns more than 300SSP. This is a government policy for every employer operating in South Sudan to abide with.

4.5 The follow-up meetings between STEWARDWOMEN and Pageri family court made the family courts to produce good reports.

4.6 **Reduction of crime rate in Mugali payam;** Reports that reached STEWARDWOMEN office from the Deputy Executive of Mugali is that the rate of crimes has greatly reduced in the area, so the presence of family court in Mugali is of great importance and has even rendered the Payam court jobless.

4.7 **Issue of Form 8 free of charge;** the Pageri police officials have agreed to issue Form 8 free of charge to survivors who have injuries if STEWARDWOMEN can make photocopies of the same and live them in their office.

4.8 Establishment of the women friendly space out of the STEWARDWOMEN SACCO.

4.9 **Transferred to a new office location in Juba;** on the 4th September 2015, STEWARDWOMEN moved to a new office location in Cecilia house, Plot no. 1400, Juba Na Bari.

4.10 **Development of an advocacy strategy;** to support the accelerated ratification for the Maputo Protocol in South Sudan.

- 4.11 **Awareness on legal and human rights;** the people in Pageri Administrative Area through the awareness campaigns, radio talk shows and the services provided by both the paralegals and the legal aid clinic are aware of their human and legal rights, how to handle gender based violence issues and how to report incidences of gender based violence. The awareness campaigns conducted by STEWARDWOMEN have also increased awareness on gender and justice issues in the community and they have also identified STEWARDWOMEN in the community as more pro people organization.
- 4.12 **Reduction in the level of GBV:** The level of gender based violence reduced in most of the Bomas in Nimule and Mugali Payam. The perpetrators are afraid of being reported to the police or other authorities and have stopped abusing women and children. For instance in Mugali, the Boma chiefs have appreciated the work of the paralegals and said that gender based violence has drastically reduced. The same result was also gathered during the end of project review in Kerepi, Magwi and Obbo as community members testified that that GBV had reduced.
- 4.13 **Community are aware about where to report their cases and the referral system;** STEWARDWOMEN is very well known in the community and are able to access legal aid services because the community are aware of where to go for help when faced with problems. People have voluntarily reported their cases to the paralegals and the legal aid clinic.

5.0 Challenges

- 5.1 The August 2015 security threat in Pageri Administrative Area affected the massive turn up of the awareness campaigns especially at Anzara and Olikwi Bomas both in Nimule Payam. Many families fled their homes and have not come back. Others come and go back.
- 5.2 Timing of the awareness campaigns also affected peoples turn up. It has been raining in the month of September 2015 hence most community members spend their times in the farms making use of the rain.
- 5.3 Breakdown of NTC radio station; STEWARDWOMEN was unable to hold the second radio talk show on the function and roles of police vis-à-vis access to justice scheduled for the 28th/09/2015 because of the breakdown of NTC FM Borongole in Kerepi Payam. This radio station is the only one in the Pageri Administrative Area. Additionally, The weather is also responsible for the poor reception at radio stations making it unpredictable to schedule for a radio talk show at a particular time.
- 5.4 Some Bomas are big and sparsely populated with people living very far from each other; this also affected the turn up of the people during awareness campaigns.
- 5.5 Ignorance about South Sudan laws; Most of the community members are still rigid with traditional ways of thinking especially in Mugali (Masindi) making it very difficult to convince them to accept the laws of South Sudan on a particular subject.
- 5.6 There were too many public holidays in the month of July 2015. This made some of the activities to remain pending.
- 5.7 The delays by donors to release fund has dragged implementation of activities.
- 5.8 The security situation in Madi corridor worsened in January 2015 making some of our beneficiaries to flee to Uganda for safety.
- 5.9 The weather condition has also been affecting our internet network hence slowing down our work.
- 5.10 The breakdown of the only radio station in Magwi Payam made it impossible for some of our beneficiaries to access our radio programmes.
- 5.11 Some of the GBV survivors do not know the whereabouts of their husbands making it difficult for STEWARDWOMEN to mediate their cases.
- 5.12 Some of the perpetrators do not turn up as expected so it keeps dragging the case and becomes costly on the side of STEWARDWOMEN in times of time and fuel. Additionally, Commitment

letters are written but ignored by perpetrators, making the victims to feel that STEWARDWOMEN is not serious or connived with the perpetrator.

- 5.13 The failure by other members to pay loan in the STEWARDWOMEN SACCO has affected giving out more loan to others with the fear that all will fail to pay hence affecting the savings negatively.
- 5.14 Along with the insecurity came the shutdown of all telecommunication networks in the area, this not only forced STEWARDWOMEN to postpone the radio talk show but also affected coordination and communication between the field office and the main office and also paralegals deep down in the villages.
- 5.15 Threats from some government agencies affected the free movement in the field as a staff of STEWARDWOMEN was arrested and detained by army officials in Pageri for baseless allegations and also tortured. This created fear in the staffs to move as frequent and also do their work without fear or favour.
- 5.16 The lack of protection units in the area has not only acted as a barrier to access to justice but also affects people's trust in the organization they trust and run to.
- 5.17 The inflation rates in the market have affected some of the activities. The money budgeted for cannot support the market prices. This has affected a number of activities.

6.0 Recommendations

- 6.1 Next time we need to choose a debate topic which even when the opposers win has no negative connotation on the topic of the debate. We also need to plan 2 weeks a head of the debating dates together with the participating schools in order learn the school programs.
- 6.2 Need to install a better internet booth which can be a ten user so as to easily facilitate our work since 60% of our work is done on the internet.
- 6.3 We need to plan more activities in a dry season and less in dry season.
- 6.4 We need to purchase a Toyota hard top vehicle in order to facilitate the work of the field staffs on bad roads.
- 6.5 There is need for more sensitization meetings to create awareness about the existence of family court members. The family court also requested to run their programs as a jingle in the radio station.
- 6.6 There is still need for more support and guidance for family court members on the procedures of handling cases and report writing.
- 6.7 Frequent and more sensitization meetings should be conducted to change the attitude of the community.
- 6.8 Whenever an activity is conducted within the community, they should be given enough time such that the community can ask many questions in order to learn more.
- 6.9 There is need for STEWARDWOMEN to provide bicycles to family court and GBV counsellors to facilitate their movements in the community.
- 6.10 There is need for provision of identity cards to the family court officials, GBV counselors and the community paralegals.
- 6.11 Donors should speed up their process of releasing funds timely such that activities can be done in time as expected.
- 6.12 STEWARDWOMEN should devise better means of dealing and following up with perpetrators who do not respond as stated in the commitment letter.
- 6.13 Loan defaulters should be arrested to serve as warning to others.
- 6.14 There is need for more awareness campaigns as people learn very much through this exercise.
- 6.15 There is also need for frequent visits to the community by the staff and the paralegals.

Conclusion

STEWARDWOMEN managed to conduct almost all planned activities despite the insecurity threats in the country and the current economic crises which affected all budgets for the activities, we appreciate the efforts of all the staff that put their best to see that work keeps running despite the numerous challenges faced.
